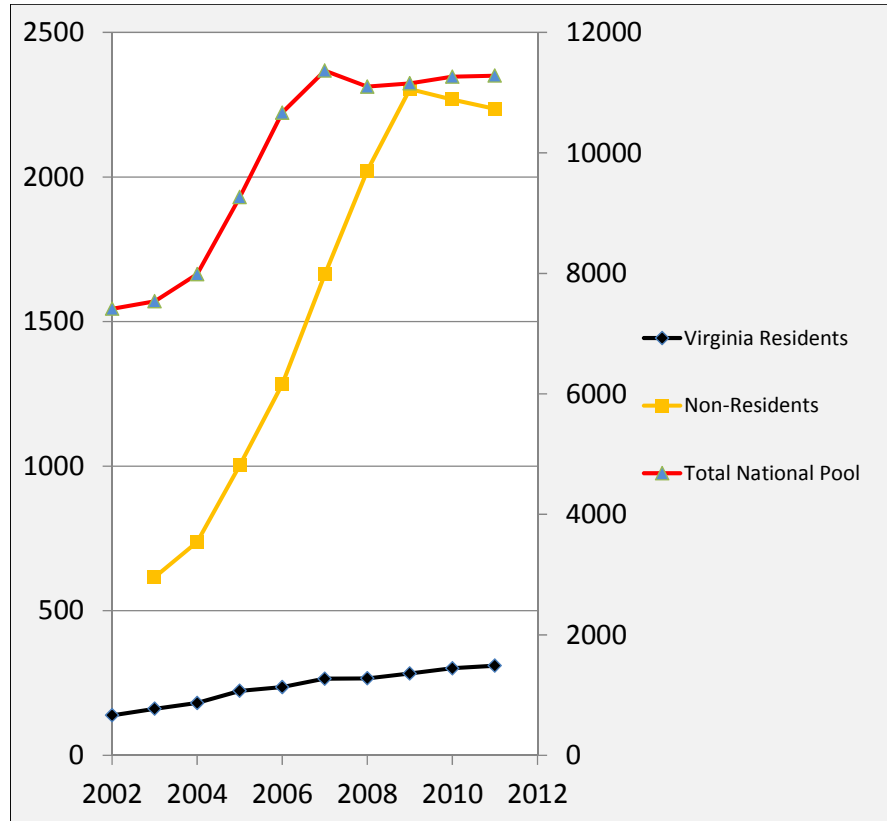

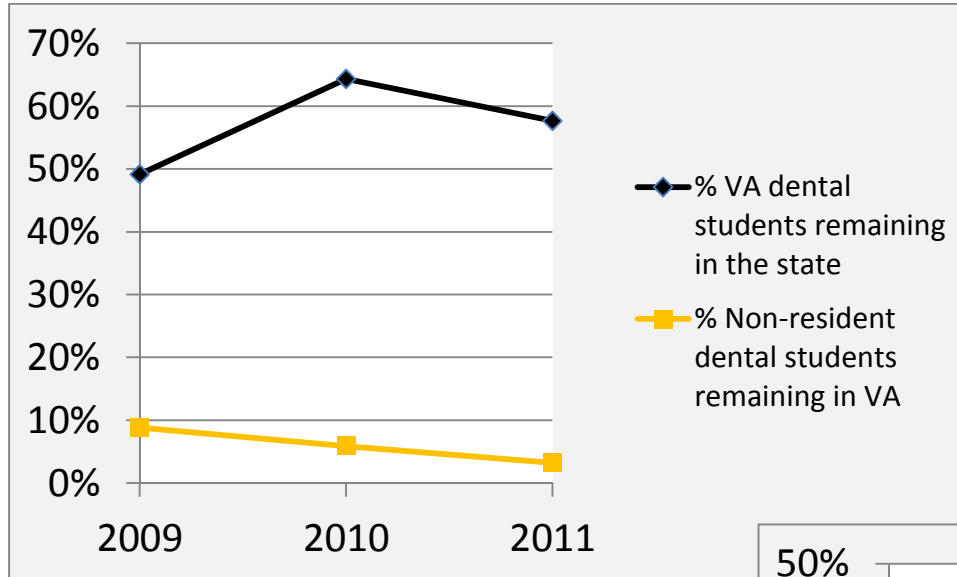
DDS Program Applications & Enrollees



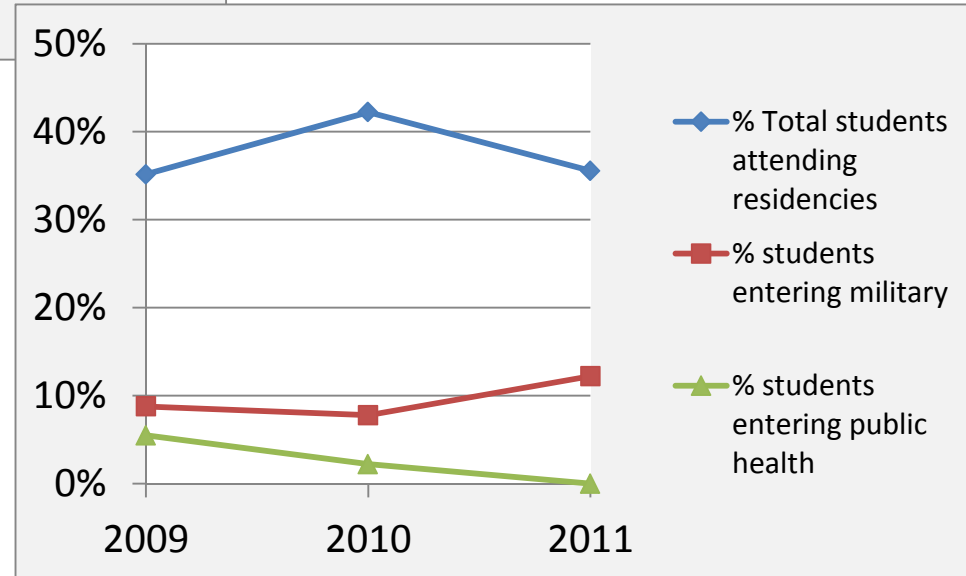
VCU % of National Pool



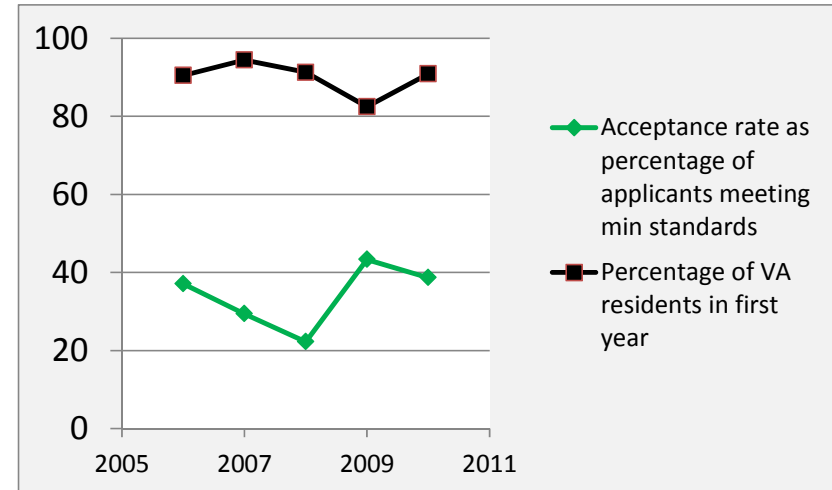
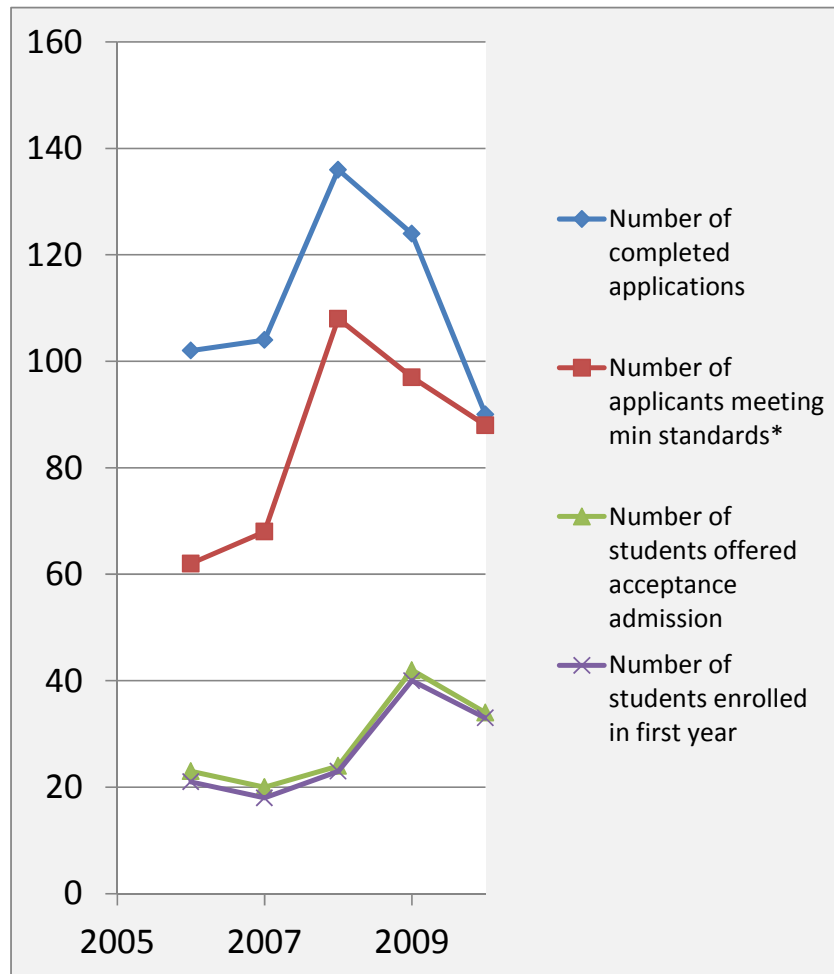
Where do our DDS graduates say they are going after graduation?



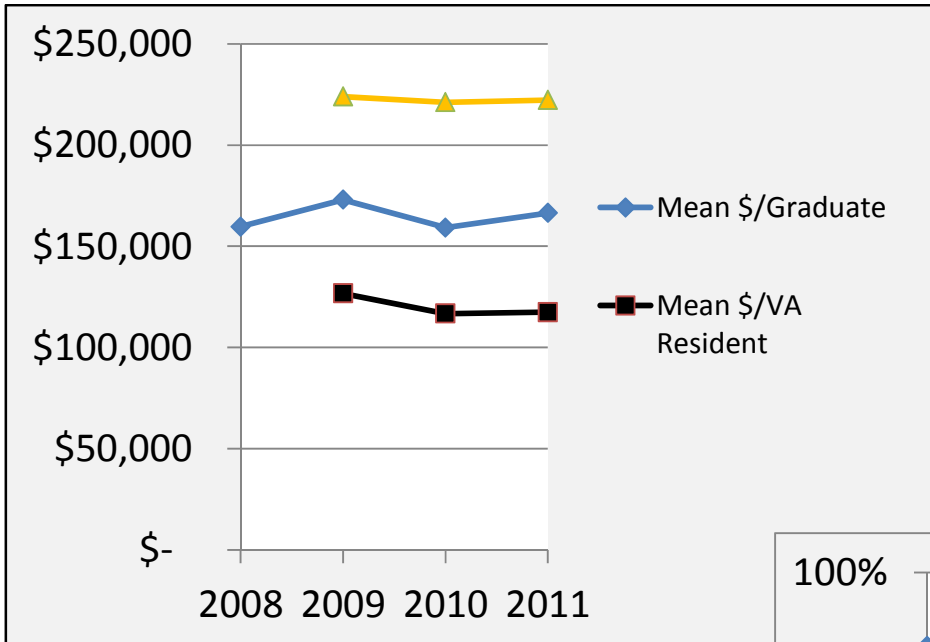

Dental Hygiene BS Program Applications & Enrollees

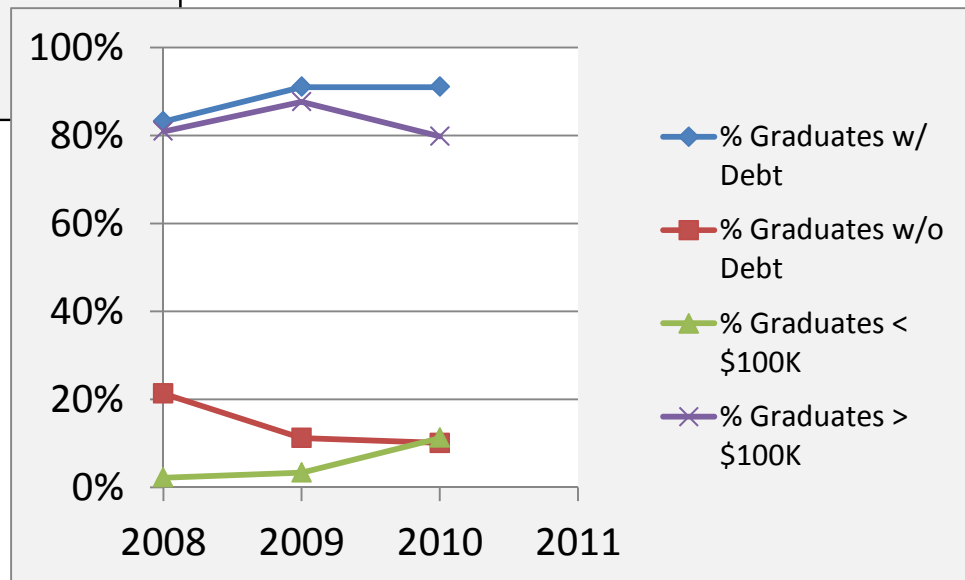


Student Debt & Cost of Education

We Can't Afford to 'Train Fewer Doctors

Seeking to reduce the federal budget, Democratic and Republican lawmakers are looking at cutting funds for graduate medical education. Specifically, they're considering reducing the Medicare reimbursement for doctor training, possibly in half, to cut about \$4 billion from the federal budget. This could dramatically limit the ability of patients to see physicians, even for critical illnesses.

Academic medical centers and teaching hospitals are where young doctors obtain the crucial skills they need to care for us all. As a part of Medicare, graduate medical education reimburses academic medical centers and teaching hospitals for about a third of the direct costs associated with training the next generation of doctors, including salaries, malpractice insurance, equipment, and the extra time necessary for senior doctors to teach procedures to new doctors. Some of the indirect costs of training are also reimbursed, including specialized standby capacity like burn treatment and intensive care.

Even now, not enough doctors are being trained. And population trends, coupled with the expansion of health insurance, indicate that funding for graduate medical

education should be increased. If funding is cut, it will reduce the number of well-trained doctors at the very time demand for more doctors is growing. The result for patients? Longer waits, from the parent seeking a "well baby" visit to the recipient of a new pacemaker needing follow-up care. Patients already have a taste of the future, even without the proposed cuts to graduate medical education. Statistics from the Department of Health and Human Services show that 10% of the population today may wait months to see a doctor.

Just five years ago, 70% of doctors' offices were independent physician practices. Now, less than half of doctors own their own practice. Instead, they work in offices owned and operated by hospitals. If this trend continues—and we have no reason to expect it won't—in a few short years private practices will be rare. of American Medical Colleges, we will need at least 90,000 additional doctors by 2020 to meet this increased demand, almost equally divided between general practice physicians and specialists. Five years later, the need for doctors is expected to grow to 130,000. To keep pace, this nation will need to train an additional 6,000

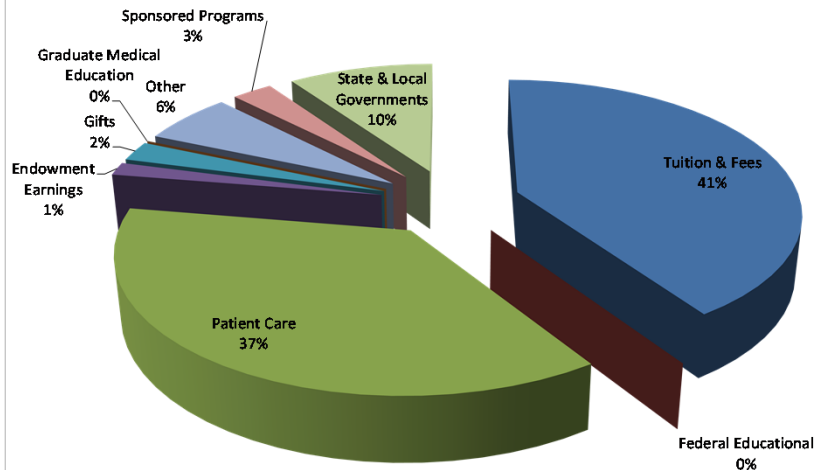

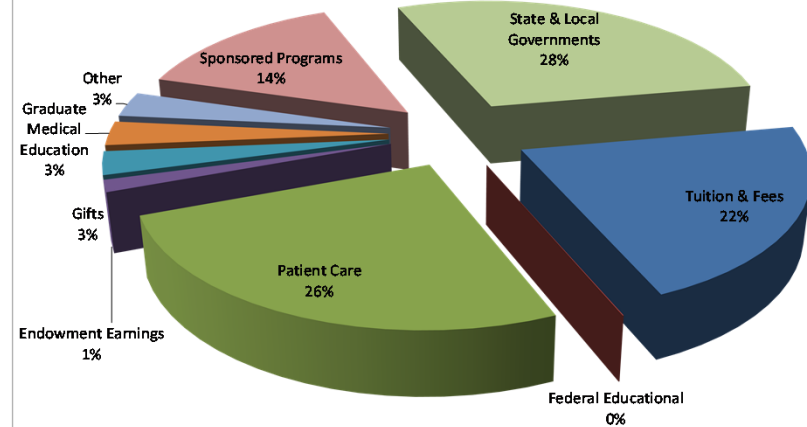

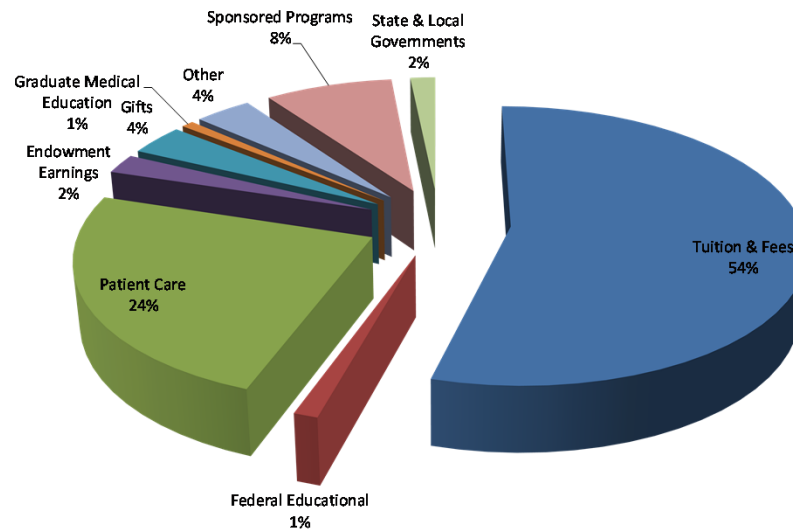
**Revenue for VCU School of Dentistry

Department of Oral Health Promotion and Community Outreach at VCU School of Dentistry

At its November 10, 2011 meeting, the Virginia Commonwealth University Board of Visitors approved the creation of a new department in the School of Dentistry. The Department of Oral Health Promotion and Community Outreach was formed to coordinate and expand community engagement activities of students and faculty in the School of Dentistry. The new department consists of community-based dental education programs (service-learning and community service activities for dental and dental hygiene students) as well as community partnerships for improved access to oral health in urban and suburban areas. The mission of the Department of Oral Health Promotion and Community Outreach embraces a commitment to socially responsible education, patient care, research, and the community in educating competent clinicians who will serve the needs of the public and improve the health and well-being of society. To achieve this mission, the department plans to secure grants to increase access to care by providing services through an enhanced curriculum. In addition, community engaged scholarship through health services research is planned. The BS program in Dental Hygiene will administratively reside within the Department of Oral Health Promotion and Community Outreach and the existing Division of Dental Hygiene faculty will become the faculty of this new department. Ms. Kim Isringhausen, currently Director of Dental Hygiene and Community Based Education Programs, will chair the department. Ms. Michelle McGregor, Assistant Professor, Dental Hygiene, will direct the dental hygiene education program. Final approval for this change was received from the State Council on Higher Education Virginia in December 2011 with an effective date of January 2, 2012.

The Journal of Prosthetic Dentistry selects the most outstanding clinical report to receive the Judson C. Hickey Scientific Writing Award. The article entitled, "Randomized, prospective, clinical evaluation of prosthodontics modalities for mandibular implant overdenture treatment," published in the July 2011 issue was selected as this year's winner. Congratulations to Dr. David Burns and his co-authors, Drs. John W. Unger, James P. Coffey, Thomas C. Waldrop, and Ronald K. Elswick, Jr, for being selected for this award honoring the former Editor, Judson C. Hickey. It is indeed an honor to be selected by peers for such an award.

Burns DR, Unger JW, Coffey JP, Waldrop TC, Elswick RK: Randomized, prospective, clinical evaluation of prosthodontic modalities for mandibular implant overdenture treatment. J Prosthet Dent 2011;106:12-22.

The purpose of this study was to evaluate 3 different mandibular implant overdenture treatments with respect to prosthesis retention and stability, tissue response, patient satisfaction and preference, and complications to determine treatment outcomes. It was concluded that the 2-independent-implant overdenture treatment provided equivalent or more favorable treatment outcomes relative to the more complex and costly 2- and 4-implant bar attachments.

PILOT INTERDISCIPLINARY GRANT PROGRAM

Purpose and Eligibility

The Interdisciplinary Pilot Research Grant Program between Nursing and Dentistry is provided to fund interdisciplinary, innovative research collaborations joining faculty members from the two schools. The emphasis of these funds is to support interdisciplinary projects aimed at creating a research collaborative that will lead to a larger A.D. Williams multi-school collaborative research proposal.

Funding is possible only for full-time faculty of the two Schools who hold the rank of Assistant Professor or higher.

Procedure

Investigators should use the instructions on the A.D. Williams website for the Multi-School Research Grant Application to develop this grant application. (<http://www.adw.vcu.edu/>)

Proposal must be submitted no later than 5:00 p.m. on March 30, 2012 and proposals should be submitted electronically to Dean's Langston and Sarrett.

Award

Maximum award is \$25,000. Upon receipt of applications, a joint review committee will be appointed by the deans to review and score the proposals.

Funding will begin in May 1, 2012. The project must be completed and funds expended within the calendar year.

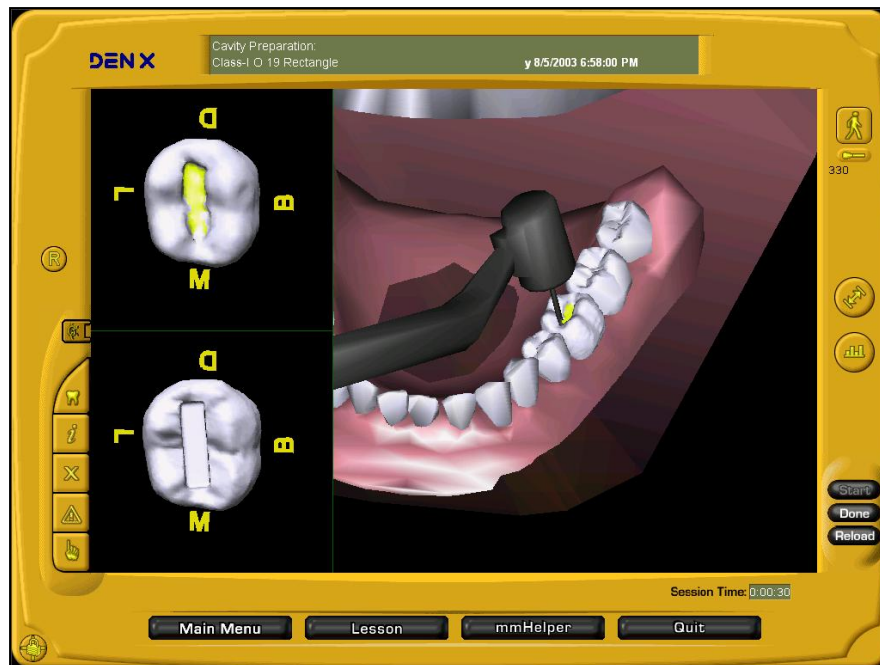

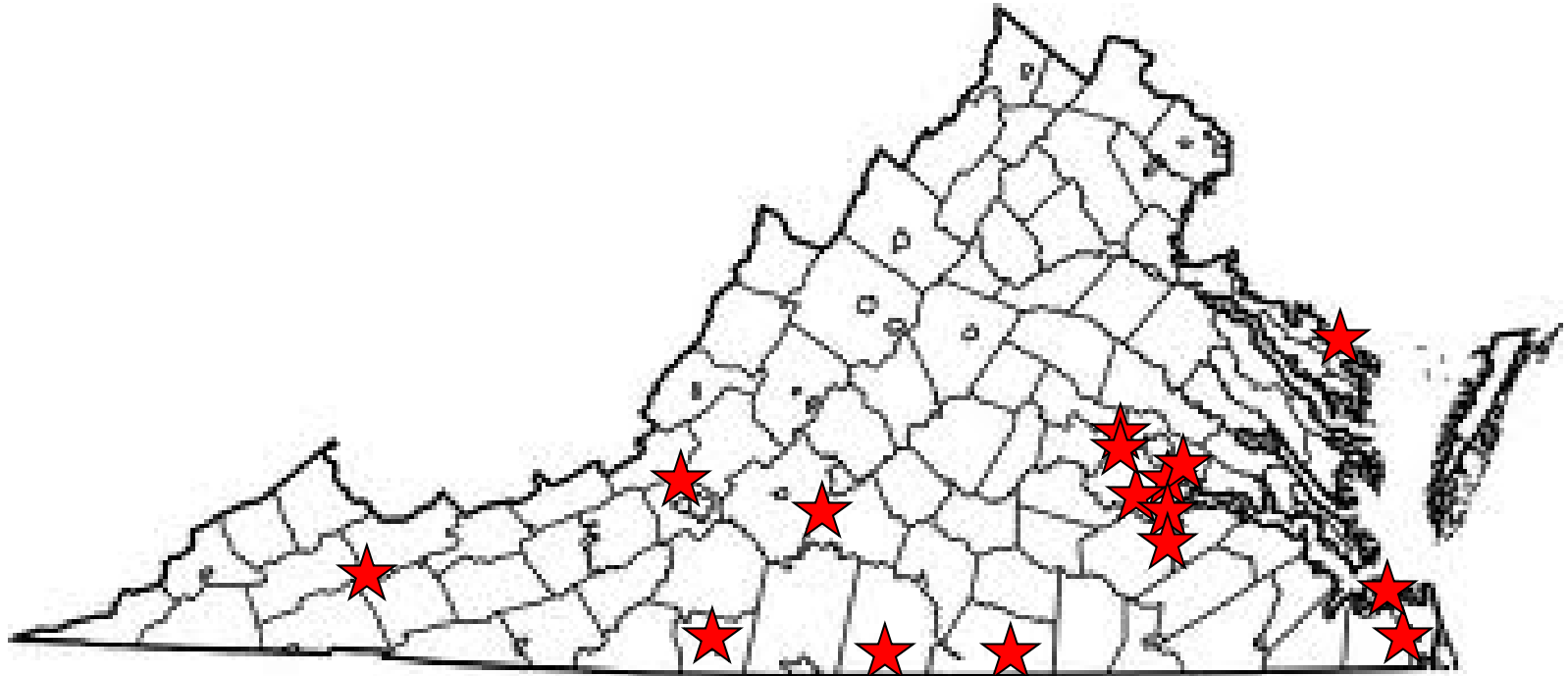

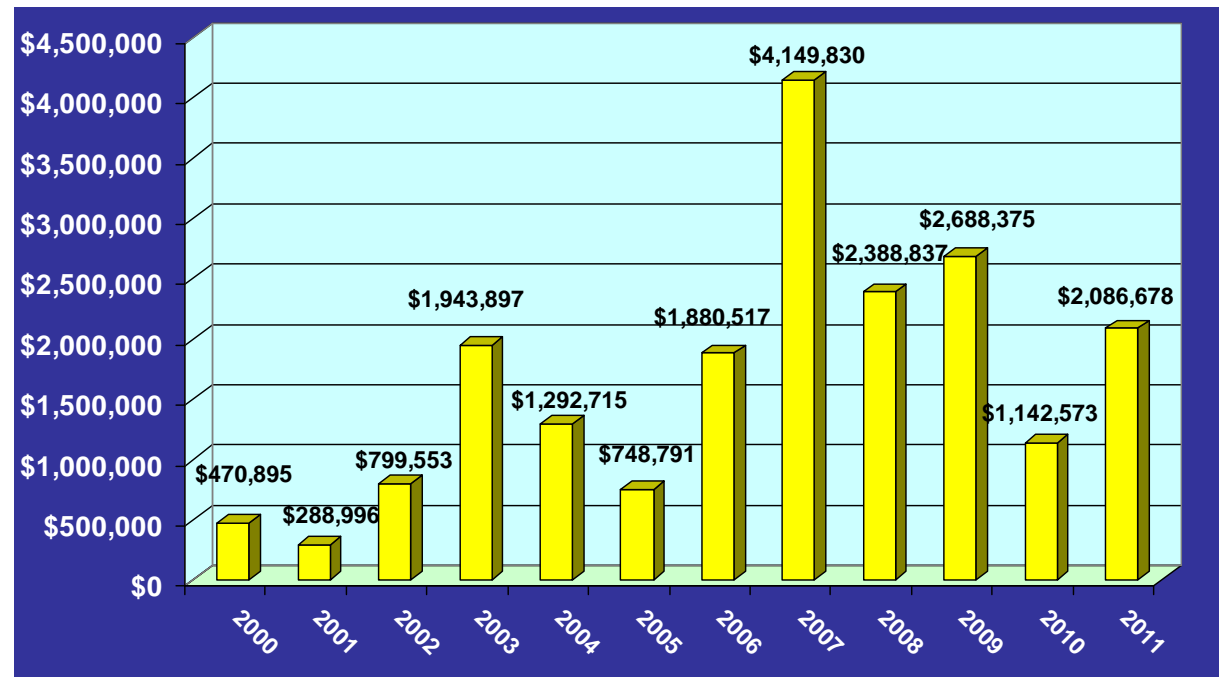


Search for Director of the VCU Philips Research Institute and Chair of the Department of Oral & Craniofacial Molecular Biology

- Virginia Commonwealth University seeks applications for a full-time faculty position as Director of the VCU Philips Institute, and Chair of the Department of Oral and Craniofacial Molecular Biology. A Salute to the DDS Class of 1951

The DDS Class of 1951 is unique in the history of the School of Dentistry. The class membership is wholly comprised of World War II veterans who served in the African, European and Pacific Theaters and in each military branch. Members' experiences included fighting in Patton's Army in the Battle of the Bulge, the awarding of a Bronze Star and witnessing the first flag raised on Iwo Jima.


Upon entering dental school, the Class of 1951 engaged in various manual, spatial and problem-solving tests as research subjects. All entering dental classes across the United States did likewise. Subsequently, test results correlated to their academic performance formed the basis for the Dental Aptitude Test.








































On the occasion of their 60th reunion, the School of Dentistry gratefully acknowledges the members of the DDS Class of 1951 for their service to country, patients, profession and school. The members' outstanding examples of class camaraderie and selfless service are enduring legacies for all students to treasure.

At their 50th reunion in 2001, the Class of 1951 presented the school's first ever 50-year class reunion gift. Their \$51,000 initial endowment grew and today supports students' travel to national meetings to present their research findings.

For 59 years, the classmates maintained contact with each other through their newsletter, "Painless Publication." Annually, members submitted personal updates to the editor to share with the class. Editorial duties rotated among all members. This unique tradition concluded with the 2011 edition, coinciding with the class' 60th reunion. The class donated the entire run of "Painless Publication" to the Tompkins-McCaw Library's Special Collections and Archives as a permanent historical record.

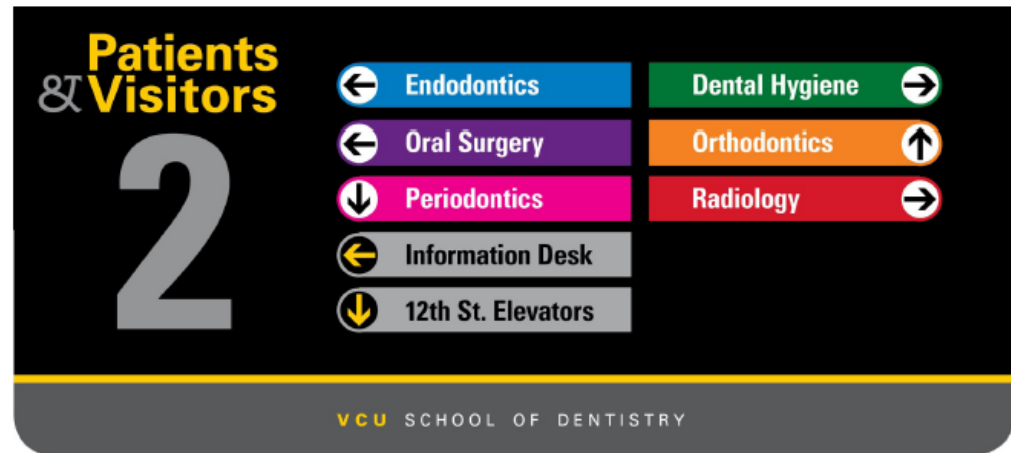

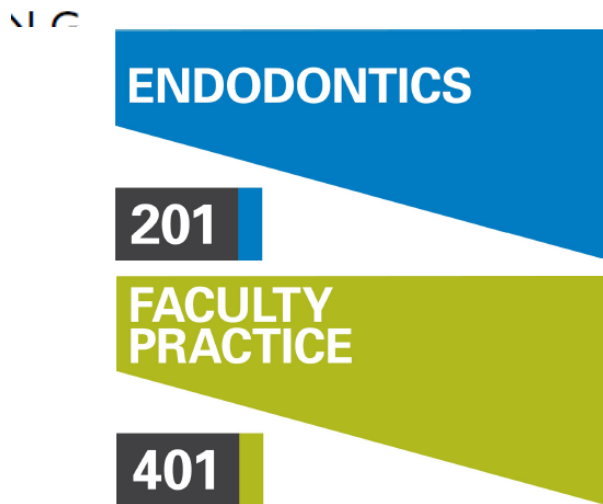




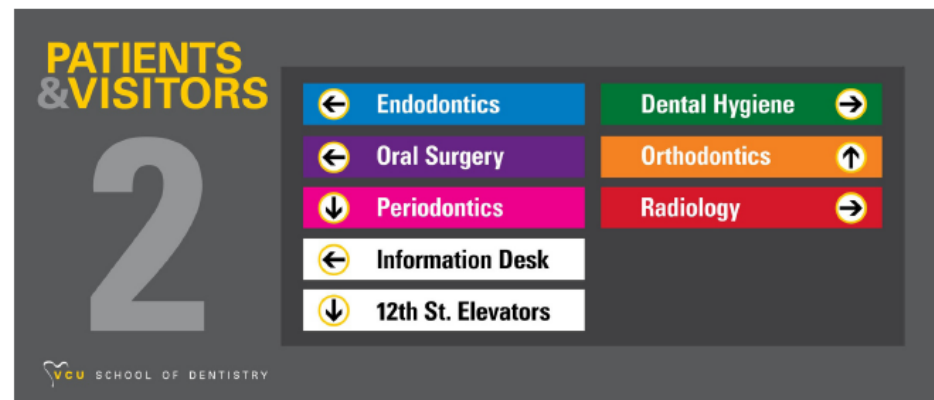
