




Major Sources of Funding To Operate the School of Dentistry: 41% Tuition & Fees



We peaked at 60 dental schools in the early 1980s. We closed 7 dental schools between 1986 and 2000. We have opened and enrolled students in eight dental schools since 1999, so we are now at 61. We have four more universities that have announced the opening of new schools in 2012-2013, bringing us to 65 total.




Neighborhood Partner's Practice

- In this same clinical area is the expanded Oral Medicine and TMD practices.




Where do our DDS graduates say they are going after graduation?







94-100% of DDS students who applied for advanced education residencies were accepted to a program (2009-2011)








New Gifts and Pledges

- to date for 2013, we have established four new endowed funds.
















